Invasion

After the Romans left Britannia in AD 410, many towns fell into disrepair and the country became vulnerable to attack. This marked the beginning of a period of invasions from different groups: Picts and Scots from Scotland and Ireland; Anglo-Saxons from Germany, the Netherlands and Denmark; Vikings from Scandinavia and Normans from France. This time in history is called the early Middle Ages. This project teaches children about life in Britain after the Roman withdrawal. Children will learn about Anglo-Saxon and Viking invasions up to the Norman Conquest.

Our first text - is a beautiful book 'The Wolf's Secret' - a new story in the traditional style.



Here is an overview of the learning taking place this half term:

Memorable experience	Making Viking long boats/looking at artefact.
English	Traditional Story, non-chronological reports, poetry
Science	The human digestive system, mouth, and teeth functions. Then animals' diets and construct food chains to show the flow of energy.
History	Explore Saxon and Viking life in Middle Age Britton.
Geography	Compass points and four and six-figure grid references, physical features in the United Kingdom.
Art & Design	Weaving - how it has developed over time, i the materials and techniques required to create woven piece of work.
Pysical Eduaction	Football and Tennis
Computing	Branching databases
RE	How does believing Jesus is their saviour inspire Christians to save and serve others?

<u>Two Topic-Based Tasks:</u> To be completed and handed in before Monday 21st October 2024 (see bottom of sheet).

<u>Reading:</u> Read and record in your child's Reading Record Book at least 3 times a week. Books will be changed routinely as needed.

<u>Times Tables:</u> Must be practised regularly at home.

The Children in Year 4 will take the Multiplication Check in summer term 2025. The purpose of this check is to determine whether your child can recall their times tables up to 12, which is essential for future success in mathematics. It is an on-screen check consisting of 25 times table questions. They will then be given 6 seconds to answer each of the 25 questions. We will continue to practice regularly in school, but your child needs to be practicing at home too.

MTC is a free app that will assist in at home practice.

Physical Education: PE will be taking place in school on a Tuesday and Thursday. Children will need to bring their PE kit into school and get changed in school. PE kits should stay in school on pegs.

We are looking forward to start this New Year and the exciting learning we will be doing.

Make a board game about Anglo Saxon and Viking attacks. You must include multiplication and division facts.
