The National Curriculum Tests (NCTs)

- Children in Year 6 will sit their national curriculum tests between
 Monday 12th May 2025 Thursday 15th May 2025
- The children will be sitting 1 reading paper, 3 maths papers and 1 grammar, punctuation and spelling paper.
- Results will be published in July 2025.


Assessment and Reporting

- As of 2014 'old' national curriculum levels (eg. level 3,4,5) were abolished. We now report whether a child has reached the 'expected standard'.
- If a child is working below the expected standard this is called 'working towards the expected standard' and if a child is exceeding the standard they are 'working at greater depth within the expected standard'.
- Since 2016, test scores have been reported as 'scaled scores'.
- ► There is no test for writing. Instead the teachers will make a moderated teacher assessment.
- ▶ 25% of schools are moderated by a trained Local Authority Moderator to ensure that teacher judgements are accurate.

Scaled Scores

What is meant by 'scaled scores'?

- The score that the children achieve in the test will be converted into a 'scaled score'.
- The scaled scores range from 80 (the lowest a child can score) to 120 (the highest).
- To achieve the expected standard a child needs to achieve a scaled score of 100.



Scaled Score	Performance Indicator	
	Working below KS2 standard	
80 to 99	Working towards expected standard	
100 to 109	Working at the expected standard	
110 to 120	Working at greater depth	

Higher Attaining Pupils

- There are no separate tests for more able children
- Each test has scope for high-attaining pupils to show their strengths
- Some questions towards the ends of the tests may be difficult for many children, but they should be encouraged to attempt as much as they can.

The Tests

- English Reading (60 minutes)
- Mathematics
- Paper 1: Arithmetic (30 minutes)
- Paper 2: Reasoning (40 minutes)
- Paper 3: Reasoning (40 minutes)
- English Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling
- Paper 1: questions (45 minutes)
- Paper 2: spelling

Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling - Monday 12th May

A spelling test is administered containing 20 words, which last approximately
 15 minutes.

- There is a separate 45 minute test for punctuation, grammar and vocabulary.
- Most of the questions require short answers including multiple choice.
- Marks for the two tests are added together to give a total for grammar, punctuation and spelling.

Children are given 60 minutes in total, which includes reading the texts and answering the questions.


- A total of 50 marks are available.






Mathematics

- Wednesday 14th and Thursday 15th May


- Children will sit three test papers.
- Paper 1 test arithmetic. It lasts 30 minutes and covers calculation methods for all operations, including fractions, decimals and percentages.
- Papers 2 and 3 cover problem solving and reasoning, each lasting for 40 minutes.
- In paper 2 and 3 the pupil's calculation skills are tested in contexts.








These two shapes have the same perimeter.







Access Arrangements

- These are accommodations and adaptations provided to support children with specific needs during the tests. They're there to ensure every child has an equal opportunity to show their abilities.
- Additional Time is applied for in advance (up to 25% additional time)
- Other access arrangements include scribes, transcription, translations, readers, rest breaks, keeping children focused (prompters)
- If you feel that your child is in need of access arrangements to support them in the tests, please speak to your child's teacher

How to help your child

- First and foremost, support and reassure your child that there is nothing to worry about and they should always just try their best.
- Ensure your child has the best possible attendance at school.
- Use CGP revision books other SATs prep revision books to help children revise and prepare at home.
- Read with your child daily and ask them questions about their understanding of the reading.
- Practice arithmetic (e.g times tables). Short but frequent practice is best. Make use of car journeys, quick fire questions while eating breakfast.
- Make sure your child has a good sleep and healthy breakfast every morning!
